## **New ACE Action Plan Adopted**

At COP27 and CMA4, Parties adopted a fouryear ACE Action Plan under the Glasgow work programme (GWP), which sets out short-term, clear and time-bound activities in the four priority areas of the work programme and across the six elements of ACE in a balanced manner as a concrete step towards empowering all members

## COP 28 Presidency Announces UN Climate Change High-Level Champion

Razan Al Mubarak has been announced as the UN Climate Change High-Level Champion from the COP28 Presidency. She will be joining *Dr. Mahmoud Mohieldin* who continues in his role as the UN Climate Change High-Level Champion from the COP27 Presidency. Al Mubarak is currently President of the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN), the second woman to lead the organization in its 75-



year history. She is also the founding director of the Mohamed bin Zayed Species Conservation Fund which, since its inception, has supported more than 2,500 species conservation projects in over 160 countries. Through the Marrakech Partnership for Global Climate Action, the Champions accelerate ambitious climate action among non-State actors, including cities, regions, businesses, investors and civil society, with the speed, scale and justice needed in support of Parties and the UNFCCC process.

The two Champions will work together to advance the improved <u>Marrakech Partnership</u> <u>five-year plan</u> to drive greater ambition from non-State actors to achieve a net zero, climate-resilient future, building on the foundational leadership of the Marrakech Partnership.

### The Road to Stockholm+50 Report Highlights Youth and Green Future for Asia and the Pacific

On 2-3 June 2022, the Stockholm+50 Conference took place to tackle central climate challenges and provide young people with an opportunity to influence the climate agenda. To ensure strong youth participation at the event, YECAP co-convening partners (UNFCCC/RCC Bangkok, and UNICEF) and the Youth Fellows, with the support of SIDA, organized a series of national and regional consultations for young people. In addition to two regional consultations. consultations were held across 9 countries with more than 4,000 young people attending the events.



The consultations provided a platform for young people, particularly those from marginalised communities, to raise their voices and influence climate action both at home and abroad. You can access the report for more details <u>here.</u>

### New Report Examines Developing Country Experience in Assessing and Meeting Costs of Adaptation




A synthesis report developed under the guidance of the Adaptation Committee and LEG has found significant progress by developing countries in assessing the costs of adaptation in recent years. Almost half of developing countries have now assessed and reported on adaptation costs estimates in their latest NDC updates and recent NAPs, many including detailed and comprehensive estimates of adaptation costs. A growing number are already financing adaptation through domestic expenditure. But costing

adaptation at national and local levels is a complex and challenging endeavour.

This synthesis report, the second in a series, synthesizes relevant lessons, insights, and good practices in developing country Parties, based on a review of national reports submitted to the UNFCCC secretariat. You can download the report <u>here.</u>

### Technologies for Adaptation: Innovation, Priorities and Needs in Agriculture, Water Resources and Coastal Zones

A new technical paper from the Adaptation Committee examines the innovation, priorities and needs with respect to technologies for adaptation in agriculture, water resources and coastal zones, identified by developing countries as their highest priorities for adaptation technology needs. It also provides a detailed snapshot of technology transfer efforts in those priority areas supported by the Climate Technology Centre and Network (CTCN), Green Climate Fund, Global Environment Facility and Adaptation Fund, and covers the barriers, gaps, and challenges that complicate the identification,



development, and development and deployment of technologies.

The report also reviews the use and status of frontier technologies (e.g. AI and machine learning) for adaptation, and innovation efforts. Finally, it provides a selection of good practices and opportunities to help make sure current and future technologies fulfil their potential in enhancing adaptation action. Read more <u>here.</u>

### Issue Brief "Environmental and Sustainability Implications of the Ukraine War for East and South Asia: Sustainability and Decarbonisation Should Be Accelerated Not Paused"

This paper from the Institute for Global Environmental Strategies (IGES), RCC Bangkok host partner, urges governments to speed up, not slow down, transitions away from fossil fuels and toward more sustainable



development patterns. For both energy and climate security, energy, conservation and efficiency will produce the quickest short-term results. Investments in new fossil fuel production take a long time to complete so they cannot solve short-term disruptions. New energy investment should be shifted from fossil fuels to renewable energy, which is now more price competitive in many situations. The war is not a reason to "hit pause" on

decarbonisation or SDGs.
